

As we prepare for Christmas, we are encouraged during the Philip Fast/Pilypivka, to do good works through prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

As we approach the Philip Fast in preparation for the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord, let our focus be on the needy as we fast. All of this emphasis on fasting during this period is to prepare our hearts for the coming of Our Savior. Beginning on November 19 through December 17, the Saint Peter and Saint Paul Ukrainian Catholic Parish will sponsor a "Philip Fast Food Pantry Project", collecting non-perishable food staples to be donated to the Saint Francis Pantry at Assumption

TWENTY FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

EPISTLE - EPHESIANS 4: 1 - 6 GOSPEL - LUKE 12: 16 – 21 TONE 8

The rich farmer is a fool not because he is wealthy or because he saves for the future, but because he appears to live only for himself, and because he believes that he can secure his life with his abundant possessions.

Jesus doesn't call the man evil or wicked or horrible. He calls him foolish because his life was built on the foolish idea that if he just had more stuff, it would all be good. That seemed to be working for a while but then the man made one big mistake: He died!

In the parable of the Rich Man/Rich Fool (Luke 12:16-21) Jesus tells of the man who tears down his barns to build bigger ones. This sounds quite a bit like our days. Many cities and towns across our country are experiencing massive homes being built and older homes being torn down in favor of huge new ones. In addition to homes, witness the numerous Walmarts, Targets, Costcos, Home Depots, supermarkets, and fitness clubs (ironically) being raised to resemble airports.

But that's not all. Although there is some backlash lately, watch out for all those Sport Utility Vehicles (SUVs) on the road that seem to be getting bigger and bigger, and faster and faster. These vehicles are accommodating children and adults who are bigger than in previous generations. Mc Donald's may have done away with their "Super-Size" option, but Americans have not.

Even so, it may not be the desire for more crops and bigger barns that are the rich man's undoing. When it is all over and done with, God asks him one simple question - "Fool, this night your soul is required of you, and all these things you have prepared, whose shall they be?" It is not the abundant crops and big barns that condemn the rich man, it is that they are not being shared and passed on to others. Being rich is not a sin, being selfish is. It can be argued that we have an obligation to maximize the fruits of the earth so that we may feed and provide for our children and for others. Working hard to provide for others is a virtue sometimes lost on a generation wishing to accumulate more cars, houses, jewelry, and toys.

Everything we have built, earned, or amassed has come from God, and is a blessing. If we think everything we have has come from our own efforts, our possessions will be a curse. Sharing God's blessings is not only one of our obligations, but also one of the greatest joys in life. Not enough people today experience this joy.

There is nothing wrong with wealth, as long as God is thanked and glorified, and the wealth is shared. There is nothing wrong with big homes, as long as they are filled with children and family members, and God is at the center of the home. There is nothing wrong with amassing crops and goods, as long as they are used to feed and provide for God's children.

We are brothers and sisters in communion with each other. All that we have is from God and intended to be shared with each other. The difference between a Philanthropist and a Rich Fool is the desire to share, and the desire to do for others and not for oneself. (Excerpt from https://www.goarch.org/ Fr. Angelo Artemas)

Our lives and possessions are not our own. They belong to God. We are merely stewards of them for the time God has given us on this earth. We rebel against this truth because we want to be in charge of our lives and our stuff.

Being rich is not the same as being rich towards God. Blessing received from God are by God's design meant to enable us to give – not just to be thankful but to be generous as well. In this period of the Philip Fast, let us remember our instructions for prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Let us remember those in need and share our wealth and goods with those less fortunate. **CATECHISM - CHRIST OUR PASCHA - TODAY'S EPISTLE / GOSPEL LESSON**:

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 21 FEAST OF THE ENTRANCE OF THE THEOTOKOS INTO THE TEMPLE The Entrance of the Most Holy Theotokos into the Temple is a liturgical feast celebrated on November 21 by the Catholic, Eastern Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and some Anglo-Catholic Churches. The feast is associated with an event recounted not in the New Testament, but in the apocryphal Protoevangelium of James. According to that text, Mary's parents, Joachim and Anne, who had been childless, received a heavenly message that they would have a child. In thanksgiving for the gift of their daughter, they brought her, when still a child, to the Temple in Jerusalem to consecrate her to God. Mary remained in the Temple until her twelfth year, at which point Joseph was assigned to be her quardian. What is the spiritual meaning of the feast? Before all it tells us about the readiness and cheerful disposition of Mary's parents, SS. Joachim and Anne, with which they offered their little daughter to the service of God. In one of the hymns we are told that Anne, after bringing little Mary into the temple, encouraged her with these words: "Go, my child, go to Him who gave you to me, and become an offering to Him, as a sweet smelling sacrifice." But not only did the pious parents offer their child to God with gladness, but the child also willingly obeyed them, being convinced that such was the will of God. This Feast is no longer a day of obligation. In the Eastern Rite Church the feast always falls during the Nativity Fast. The Church has lessened fasting rules for this feast. As we are in the Nativity Fast, let us observe the fasting regulations in honor of our Blessed Mother.

## **Week 2: Presentation of the Theotokos**

- 1. Read the story of this Week's Feast (see below) slowly and meditatively to yourself. Reflect on the reading and on how you "entered the Temple." i.e. on your encounter with God in the Church. Consider the following questions:
  - How have you "encountered God in the Temple" in your participation in the worshipping Services of the Church?
  - How have you "encountered God in the Temple" in your participation in the life of the Church?

#### Then, reflect on your experiences of love for/from God in Church.

- 2. Pray/Sing the Tropar and Kondak of the Week with your family.
- 3. Read the story of this Week's Feast aloud slowly and meditatively with your family.
- 4. Discuss your encounter with Jesus with your family.
- 5. Ask your family members(s) the following questions:
  - What are some of the things they enjoy about praying in Church?
  - Can they sing a song from Church?
  - Other than the Divine Services, what do they like about Church?
  - Would they invite their friends to Church? Why?
  - What would they say to express to their friends that attending Church is a worthwhile experience?

- 6. Discuss what kind of "Penance" you chose for St. Philip's Fast and how this Penance will help bring you "back closer to God." Remember, a Penance is not a self-punishment. It is an expression of Repentance, of coming back closer to God.
- 7. Conclude with a reading of the antiphon of St. Philip's Fast

#### Antiphon of St. Philip's Fast

O Bethlehem, be prepared; Eden is opened to all; O Ephratha, be made ready; for in the cave the tree of life has blossomed forth from the Virgin; for her womb has been shown to be a spiritual paradise, in which is the divine plant, from which having eaten, we will live and not die as Adam did. Christ is born to raise the image that had fallen.

#### **Tropar - Tone 4**

Today is the prelude of the good pleasure of God, and the proclamation of salvation for the human race. in the temple of God the Virgin is clearly revealed and beforehand announces Christ to all. To her, then, let us cry out with a mighty voice: Rejoice, fulfillment of the Creator's plan.

Kondak - Tone 4

The Savior's pure Temple,
the precious bridal chamber and
Virgin, the sacred treasury of the
glory of God,
is brought today into the house of the Lord;
and with her she brings the grace of the divine Spirit.
God's angels sing in praise of her:
She is indeed the heavenly dwelling
place.

#### **Presentation of the Theotokos**

According to tradition, the parents of the Virgin Mary, Righteous Joachim and Anna, praying for an end to their childlessness, vowed that if a child were born to them, they would dedicate it to the service of God.

After their prayers were answered, and when the Most Holy Virgin reached the age of three, the Holy parents gathered together their relatives and acquaintances, and dressed the all-pure Mary in Her finest clothes. With the singing of sacred songs and lighted candles, virgins escorted Her to the Temple (Ps. 44/45:14-15).

There the High Priest and several priests met the handmaiden of God. In the Temple, 15 high steps led to the sanctuary, which only the priests and High Priest could enter. (Because they recited a Psalm on each step, Psalms 119/120-133/134 are called "Psalms of Ascent.") The child Mary could not make it up this stairway. But just as they placed Her on the first step, strengthened by the power of God, She quickly went up the remaining steps. Then the High Priest, through inspiration from above, led the Most Holy Virgin into the Holy of Holies, where only the High Priest entered once a year to offer a purifying sacrifice of blood.

All those present in the Temple were astonished at this most unusual occurrence. The Most Blessed Mary remained in the quarters for virgins, near the Temple. Round about the Temple, through the testimony of Holy Scripture (Exodus 38; 1 Kings 1: 28; Lk. 2: 37), and

also the historian Josephus, there were many living quarters, in which dwelt those dedicated to the service of God. The earthly life of the Most Holy Theotokos from Her infancy until She was taken up to Heaven is shrouded in deep mystery. Her life at the Jerusalem Temple was also a secret. "If anyone were to ask me," said Blessed Jerome, "how the Most Holy Virgin spent the time of Her youth, I would answer, 'that is known to God Himself and the Archangel Gabriel, Her constant guardian.'" But there are accounts in Church tradition, that during the All-Pure Virgin's stay at the Temple, She grew up in a community of pious virgins, diligently read the Holy Scripture, occupied Herself with handicrafts, prayed constantly, and grew in love for God.

# His Eminence, Metropolitan Gregory's NATIVITY FAST PRAYER CHALLENGE 2023

To Be Prayed Every Evening of the Nativity Fast

Most-merciful Master, Lord Jesus Christ our God, at Your Holy Birth, the choirs of angels proclaimed peace on earth. At Your Glorious Resurrection, You came to Your disciples saying "Peace be with you!" As we prepare to celebrate Your coming in the flesh, send Your peace upon the whole world, especially upon the Holy Land and all other places of warfare and unrest. Cleanse us of all impurity, O Lord, so that our hearts may be filled with Your peace which surpasses all understanding. In this way, may we live peacefully according to Your commandments in our families, communities, and churches.
